

EARLY SUSSEX RECORDS FOR FAMILY HISTORIANS

Researching records created in the mid-19th Century and beyond is comparatively easy because information extracted from parish registers can be used in conjunction with the GRO birth, marriage & death indexes and also with the 1841 and subsequent decennial census returns. Problems can arise when researchers attempt to go further back in time. We have already created handouts covering Manorial, Poor Law and Probate records, so this Handout describes a selection of other types of records created in the 16th, 17th & 18th Centuries that exist for Sussex.

Apprentices & Masters

These records have been transcribed and indexed for the period 1710 to 1752. You will find them in SRS volume 28 and a digital copy is available from their web site at https://www.sussexrecordsociety.org.

Church Monuments

Monuments inside churches have a much better chance of survival than those in churchyards. There is a comprehensive listing in East Sussex Monuments 1530 to 1830, SRS volume 93 (ISBN 9780854450756)

Fines were a written agreement to settle a legal dispute between two or more parties, with the consent of the judge. Three volumes have been published by the SRS:

Hearth Tax

Between 1662 and 1689 the Government imposed a levy on all householders across England, Wales and Ireland that was assessed by the number of hearths in each property. There are a number of published transcripts for Sussex:

The 1785 Land Tax assessment has been published by SRS. Volume 77 is for East Sussex and volume 82 for West Sussex.

Protestation Returns

This is effectively a census of all males taken in 1641/42 of 18 years and upwards who were required to affirm their allegiance to the protestant faith. The records have survived for most of the West Sussex parishes, but none have survived for East Sussex. School Records

Sussex Schools in the 18th Century, SRS volume 81, provides details of all the schools, schoolmasters and schoolmistresses, and scholars.

Abbreviations used:

PRO / TNA = Public Record Office, subsequently renamed The National Archives SRS = Sussex Record Society. These volumes are available in both the Sussex Record Offices and also in many libraries across Sussex.

WSRO = West Sussex Record Office in Chichester
