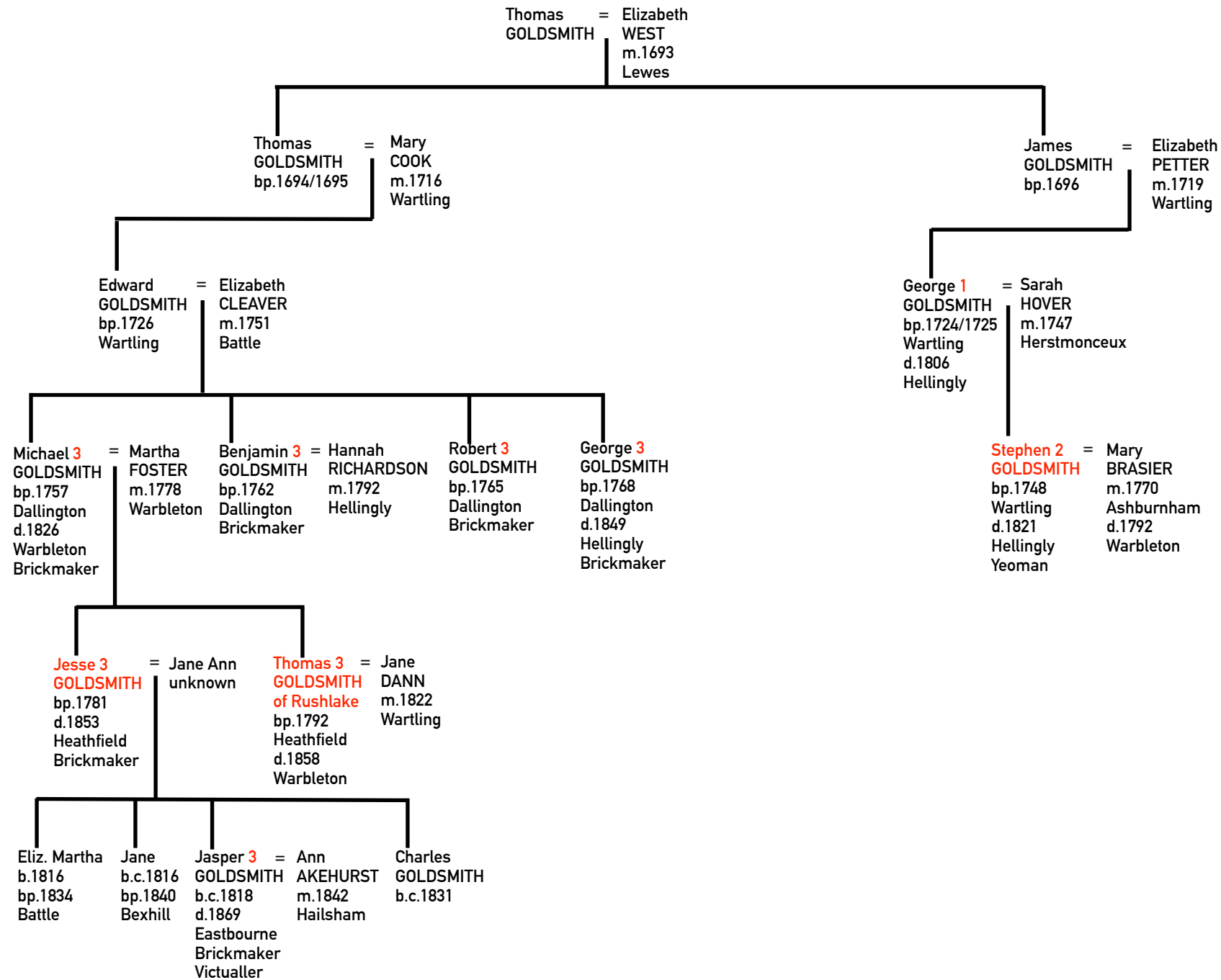
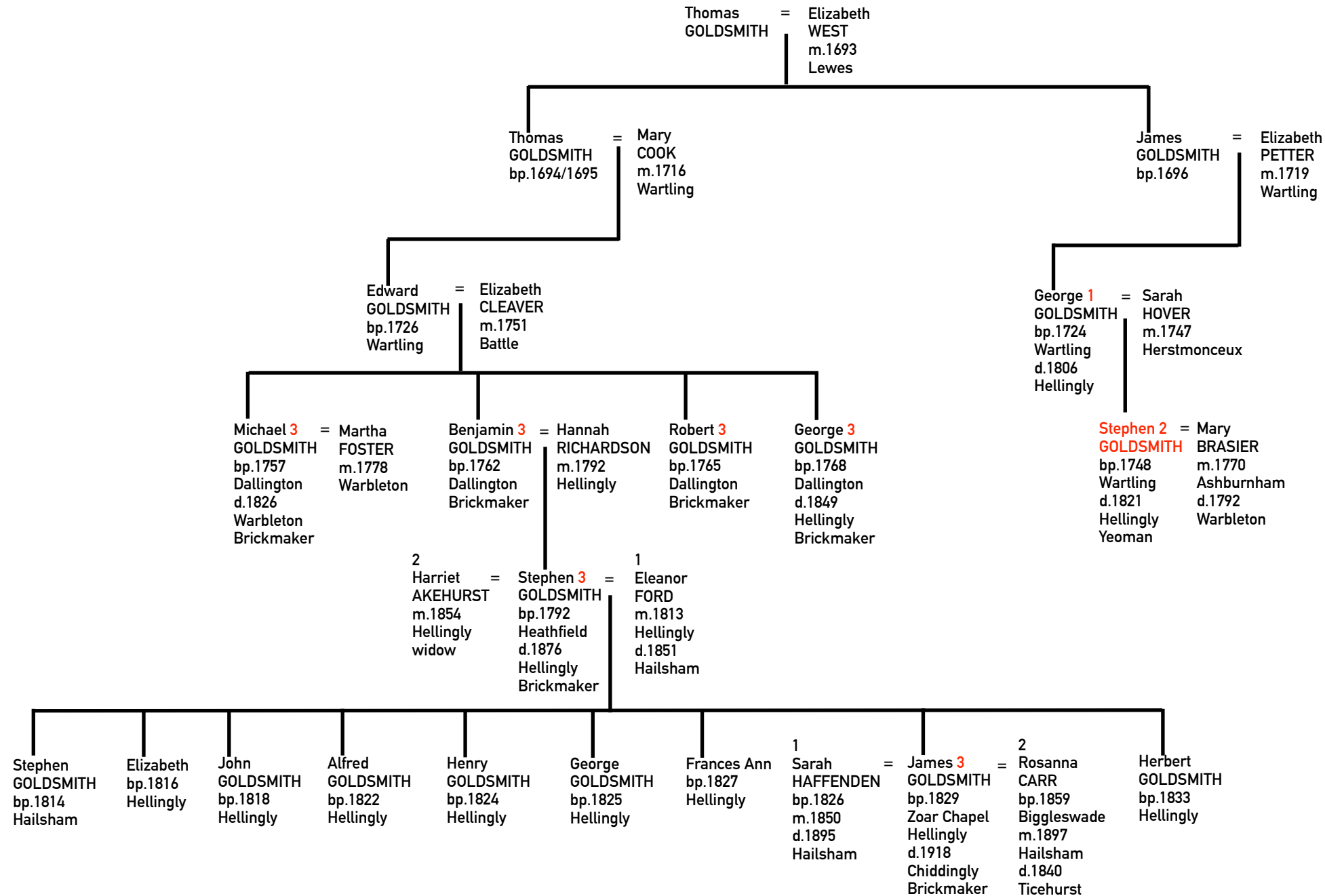




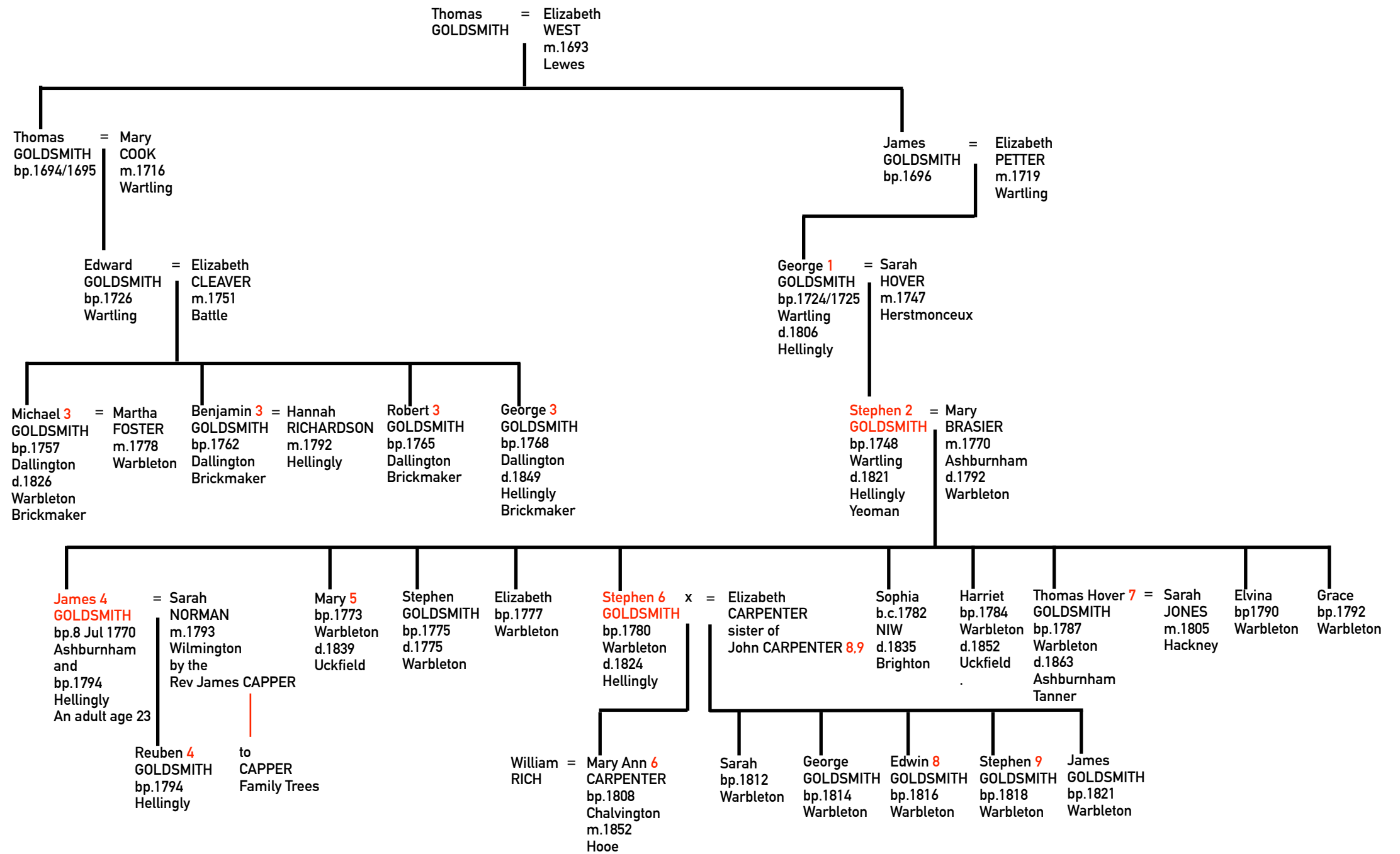

1 George GOLDSMITH, his son Stephen of Bucksteep, and Stephen's wife Sarah HOVER, were named in the 1780 will of George's brother in law, James HOVER.

2 Stephen and Sarah's first son named Stephen was baptised in 1775, and died in the same year. A second Stephen was born in 1780 to Stephen and Sarah. Stephen bp.1748 left a will in 1821, which named all his children. No baptism or marriage has been found for Sophia b.c.1782.

3 Jesse GOLDSMITH 1781-1853 was a brickmaker and was living at Tilly Brick Yard House, Wartling in the 1841 and 1851 census. The brickworks were open by 1820-c.1879, run by Jesse GOLDSMITH c.1826-c.1850.

Jesse's son Jasper GOLDSMITH b.c.1818 followed his father and uncles into brick and tile making, but by 1861 he was a victualler in Eastbourne.

Jesse's brother Thomas GOLDSMITH bp.1792 was named in the will of his uncle Thomas FOSTER.

Jesse's father Michael, and uncles Benjamin, Robert and George were in the brickmaking business at The Dicker, but ran into financial difficulties by 1811.

Benjamin's son Stephen GOLDSMITH 1792-1876 and grandson James GOLDSMITH 1829-1918 kept the family business going until about 1900.

George GOLDSMITH was a non-conformist dissenter, and a licence was granted in 1811 to allow worship at George's house. The Zoar Chapel was opened in 1839, and was next door to the brickyard. (Beswick, M. 1993, pp.78-80 and p.144).

George GOLDSMITH was buried at the Zoar Chapel in 1849.

James GOLDSMITH 1829-1918 married twice and his second wife Rose had an obituary in 1940 which gave information that James ran a brickyard in Hellingly.

Benjamin GOLDSMITH and Hannah née RICHARDSON had many more children, which were named in his 1826 will, some baptised as adults in 1825.

4 James GOLDSMITH was named as the eldest son in the will of his father Stephen 1748-1821, and was baptised 8th Jul 1770.

James was baptised again age 23, 10th Dec 1794, Hellingly, on the same day as his son Reuben.

Reuben GOLDSMITH was a brickmaker in 1841, involved in the building of the Sheffield Arms in Fletching (Beswick, 1993, p.134).

5 Mary's obituary in the Sussex Advertiser, 5th Aug 1839, named her later father Stephen GOLDSMITH, of Horsebridge Mill, Hellingly.

Mary left a will in 1839 which named her siblings.

6 Stephen Goldsmith 1780-1824 married Elizabeth CARPENTER in 1811, Chalvington.

The late Stephen and Elizabeth his widow were named in the 1836 will of Mary Goldsmith (spinster) sister of Stephen.

Stephen GOLDSMITH (1748-1821) named Mary Ann GOLDSMITH, otherwise CARPENTER, the natural daughter of his son Stephen in his 1820 will.

Mary Ann, spinster of Ninfield, married William RICH, both full age, 3rd Feb 1852. Stephen junior was named as the bride's father.

Mary Ann CARPENTER bp.19th Jun 1808, Chalvington, base born daughter of Elizabeth CARPENTER, father not named.

7 Thomas Hover GOLDSMITH 1787-1863 married Sarah JONES in Shoreditch, Hackney in 1805.

A tanner's apprentice record for Thomas was in 1803, Battle. The master was a Mr Wrenn of Messers Wrenn and Meane. Thomas would later return from London as a widower, and he was a lodger with the Wrenn family in 1851 and 1861 in Ashburnham, Sussex, where he died in 1863.

8 Edwin GOLDSMITH married Selina BENEY/BEENEY in 1836, Ashburnham. Edwin's uncle John CARPENTER was one of the witnesses.

Selina GOLDSMITH was a witness at the marriage of her sister in law, Mary Ann CARPENTER/GOLDSMITH to William RICH in 1852. John CARPENTER was also a witness at Mary Ann and William's marriage.

9 Stephen bp.1818, son of Stephen 1780-1824 and his wife Harriet née COLLINS were in Ninfield in the 1861 census, with his uncle, John CARPENTER, who was a part head of the farm with his sister Elizabeth, 'Mrs Goldsmith' in 1851. Stephen married Harriet in 1842, Ninfield.
